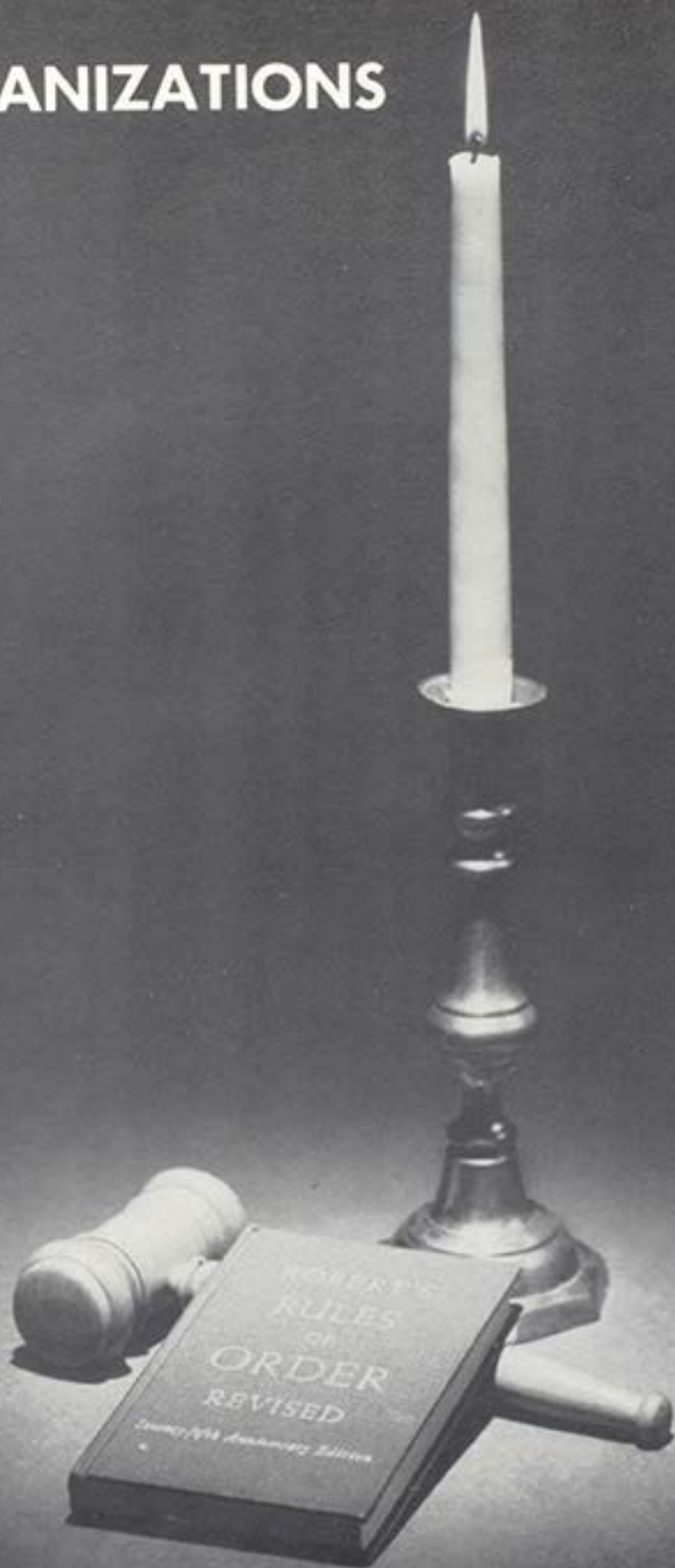

This error allowed the leading, and eventual winning, run to score from third.

Next year's squad will miss the services of this year's five graduating seniors, second baseman Bob Elliott, third baseman Joe Curry, and outfielders Roger Edwards, Allen Bennett, and Ronnie Morrison. But the returning lettermen (Ronnie Bottrell, Dwane Stirrett, Gilly Swain, and Ed Taylor) and good reserve strength should form a good all around team that could put up a battle for the conference championship next year.

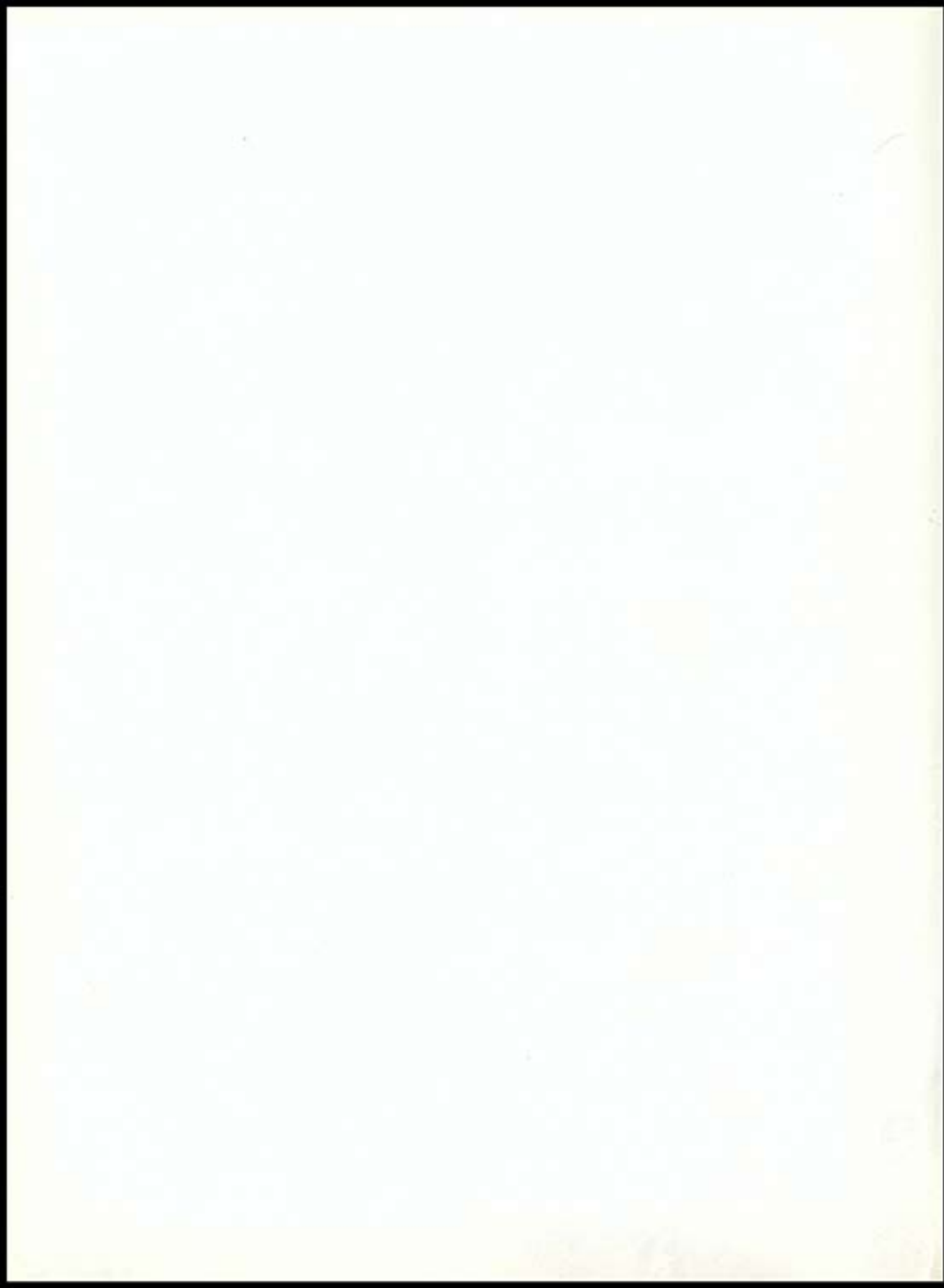


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District Winning Streak Broken

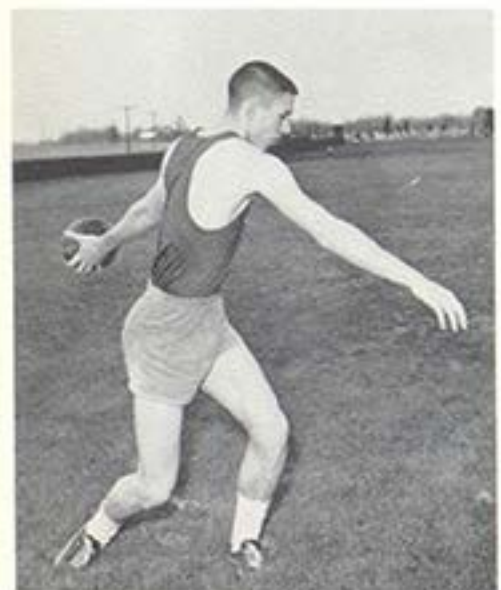

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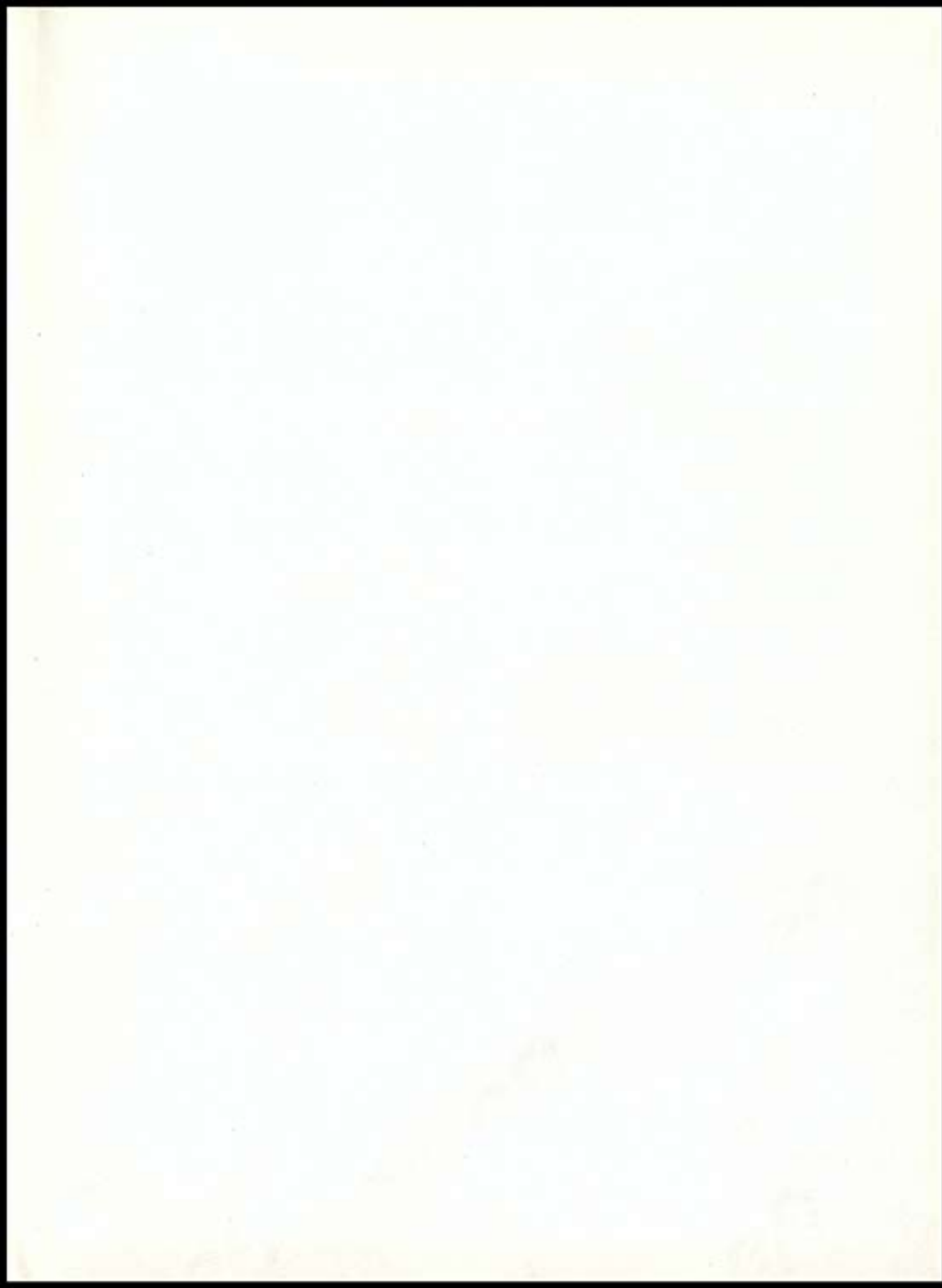
