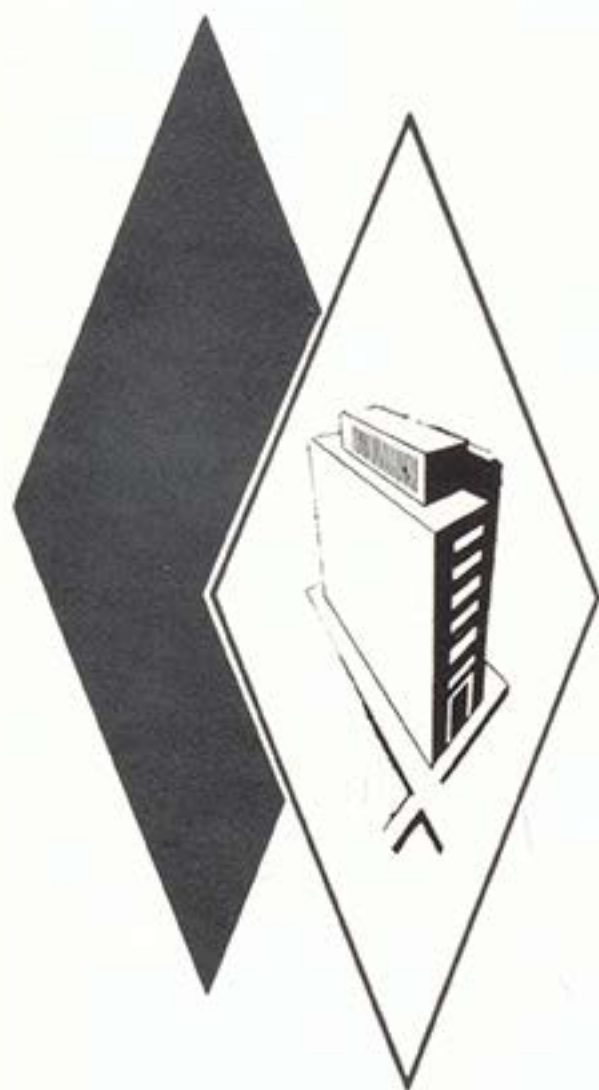

"SEARCH FOR AN ANSWER"

Windsor, Illinois
September 10, 1961

We received an anonymous letter asking for a definition of American Heritage. This question remained unsolved in our minds until we decided to run this ad in the paper. As yet we have received no answers.

We saw pictures of famous buildings and began to wonder if it couldn't be symbolized by these buildings. For example: The Statue of Liberty, the picture of the freedom and liberty enjoyed by all Americans since the founding of our nation; the capitol, an embodiment of a government of free people begun by our American forefathers; the monuments of Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln, great men of our past; Independence Hall, the home of the Declaration of Independence, the document written by intelligent men beginning the advance of a free nation; and Chicago, the sign of a growing America.

These buildings may be the physical aspect of our ideals, of which liberty is the most basic, because in the words of Albert Einstein, "There may be men who can live without political rights and without opportunity of free individual development but I think this is intolerable for most Americans." Liberty is not an object to be won and forgotten, but, "Freedom has its life in the hearts, the actions, the spirit of men and so it must be daily earned and refreshed." (Dwight D. Eisenhower). Lincoln expressed much the same idea when he said, speaking of freedom, "I would rather be assassinated on the spot than surrender it."

But these answers don't seem to apply to the students of Windsor. So we began to search for a definition which dealt with more familiar things. We turned to our friends, classmates, and faculty for help. We decided to take pictures as we questioned and to compile them in a book, the 1962 Pow Wow, for you.


