




The Board of Education of Windsor High School is the foundation for the advancement of our education. Through their minds and hands have come the fulfillment of the dreams of this community.

Mr. Charles Walker, president of the board, has been a member for eight years. Besides the school board, he devotes his time to farming and raising a large family.


Mrs. Carl Cooper is the secretary this year. She is very busy in the social activities of this community.

Through their endeavors and hard work, they have supplied us with a blueprint for our education,









MR. ORRIS A. SENG A.B., M.S. University of Illinois

MRS. CAROL AUMANN B. S. Eastern Illinois University






DOUGLAS BEGEMAN B. M. James Milliken University






This year the club attended three play days: College Play Day at Eastern Illinois University and the two spring and fall District Play Days.

Our team started the season with eleven straight victories before Brownstown appeared on the scene in the finals of the National Trail Tournament to snap this winning streak.



THE END OF THE BEGINNING







TRACK TEAM SHOWS STRENGTH


