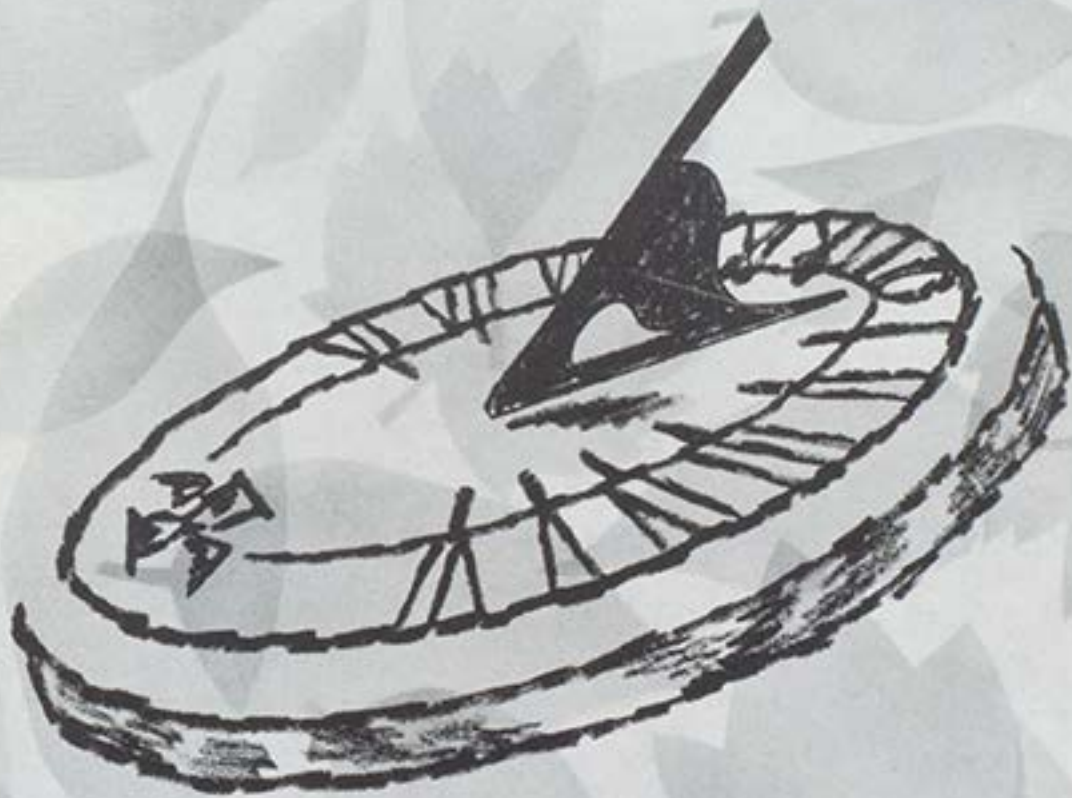

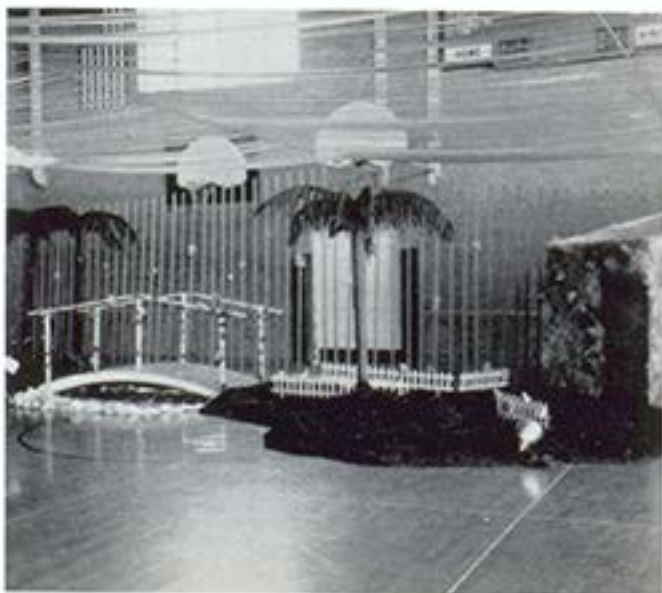




Juniors Say Seniors With

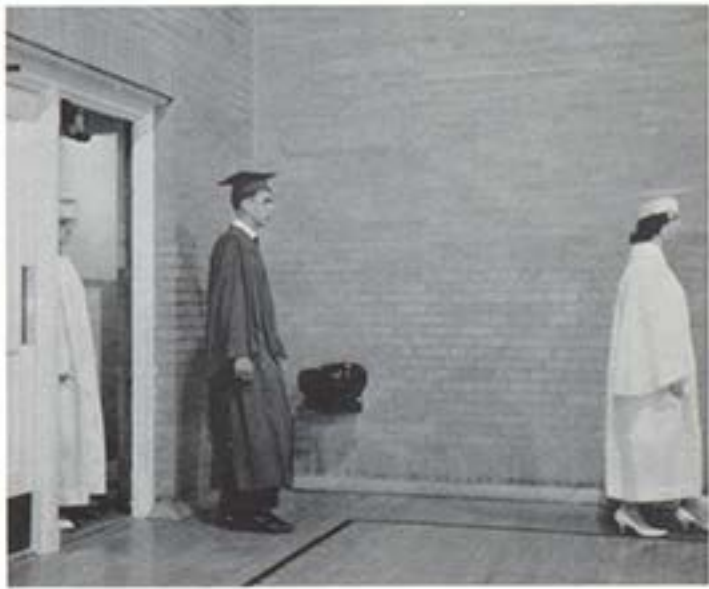

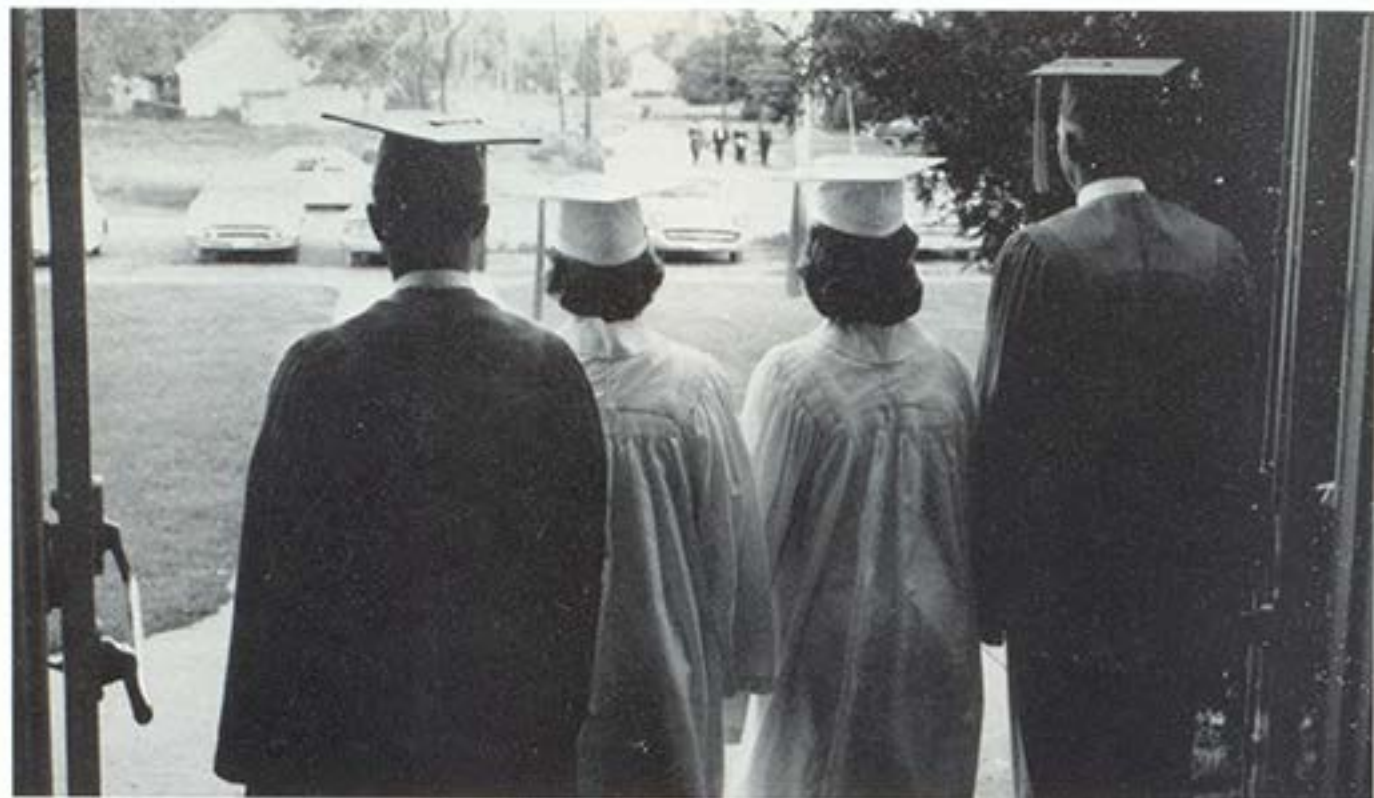


Awaited Night

As the strains of the recessional music died and the crowd dwindled, each graduate left Windsor High not as a student but as an active member of our community, ready and willing to do his part in the world.

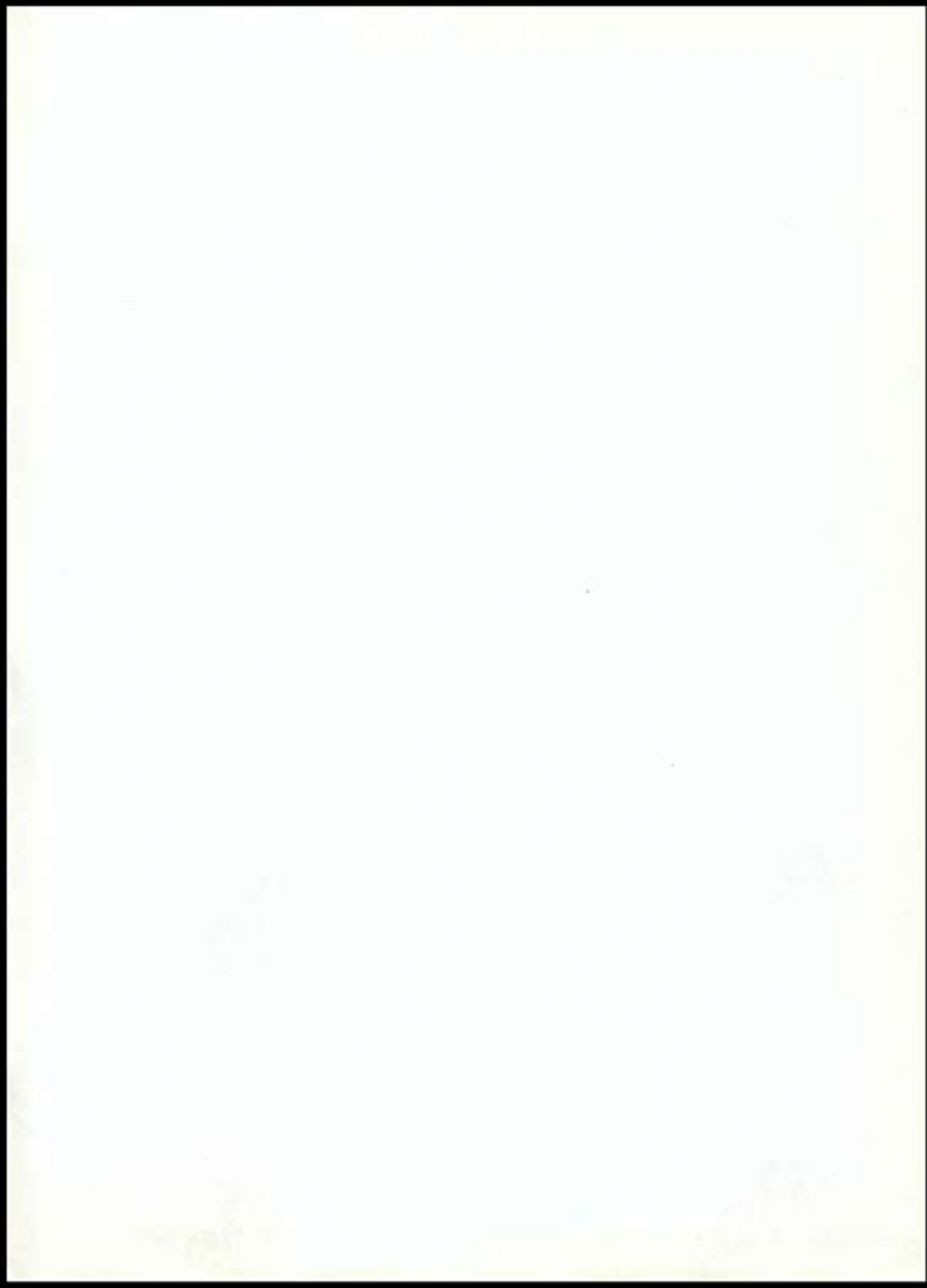




Through Those Sacred Halls of Ivy
