




Ghost Writer

The Blue Devils, with six returning lettermen, can look forward to a promising season next year. Three of the top five batters will remain to back the team's chances for another good season.







The boys thought that the Pana team was one of the cleanest teams they had played this year, and they really were good sports.

Teams entered in the tournament were Windsor, first place; Pana, second place; Shelbyville, third place; Clinton, consolation; Litchfield, Mattoon, Nokomis, and Morrisonville,

We were very proud of our fine cheering section, who consistently and strenuously backed the team and our good cheerleaders. The Windsor cheering section was as enthusiastic and showed as high a spirit as any school there. With spectator backing like that the team was sure to play its best. The fans and players will long remember that week as one of the highlights of 1965.






